## Bowling is my sport.

For most people bowling is just recreation. And I must admit it's a real nice game to play with a drink and a snack. A lot of people think about bowling and throwing darts as an excuse to go to bar. This changed when the Dutchman Raymon van Barneveld was very successful in the world championships. From that time throwing darts is like a hype that knows many players and is broadcasted on TV.

For me bowling is a sport that I like to play on the highest level as possible. I worked as a barman in Bowling Erica in St. Hubert. Offcourse every once and a while I tried to throw a ball. With the advises and tips from experienced players and with some training I made very good progress and I liked to join the club. I started playing in the house league and next season I played in the national league.

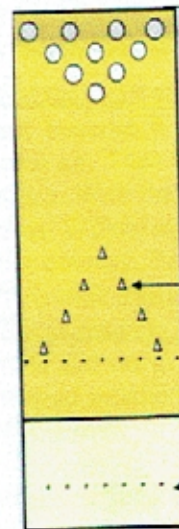
National there are the 1<sup>st</sup> until the 4<sup>th</sup> class for 3 and for 5 player teams. Then there is the head class for 3 and 5 player teams and on top there is the premier division. Again for 3 and for 5 player teams.

I started off in a trio in 3<sup>rd</sup> class and we grew to head class. Then they asked me to join a 5 player team playing premier league. I joined this team for three seasons. Then my wife Patricia got pregnant with our daughter Lotte. That's why I had to quit the team. There wasn't enough time for training and being away from home all weekends because of bowling. It

wasn't difficult to choose but still I am proud that I have played bowling in Dutch highest level. Nobody can take that from me anymore.

### The sport itself.

Bowling is a nice game for young and old people on each level. And like in other games practice makes the master. Offcourse the target is to throw as many strikes (all ten pins in one frame) as possible. And when some pins are still standing after one go, to spare these. (The rest of the pins in a second frame) One turn consists of two frames. The highest possible score is 300. This is called a perfect game. There is another game that is called skittle and is played with nine pins. Some call it ninepin-skittle.

Arrows; for aiming on the alley

Approach; This part of the alley is for the running start.

Dots; Points to start off with the running start. Very important when sparing.

### Certification:

Bowling centres that are connected to the NBF (Dutch Bowling Federation) are judged by the federation. They have to answer to strict regulations to get a certification. Without this certification the owner of the establishment is not allowed to organise an official tournament or join the leagues.

### Alley conditions:

With special equipment an oil filter is put onto the alley according to a, by the NBF ordered, pattern. The tuning off this equipment is a specialized job. It needs an experienced person to do so because one has to consider the weather conditions and the moistness of the air. It has to do with the viscosity of the oil.

### The Bowlingball:

The different balls don't vary in size, like a lot of people think, but in weight. The weights varies from 10 to 16 pounds. The 10 to 14 pound balls are used by youngsters and ladies. Gentlemen use balls from 14 to 16 pounds.

### The holes:

The size and position of the holes in the ball are very important. With a conventional ball, that is used by beginners, one can put the fingers until the second lid into the ball. More serious players use balls with a fingertip drilling. With this balls one can put only until the first lid into the ball. The player can give more turns to this ball. Then there is a difference between a striking ball and a sparing ball. The sparing ball has a longer sliding phase then a striking ball which starts turning earlier. The holes in a bowling ball for personal use are drilled to the hand of the player.

### Costs.

As it is with everything one can make bowling as expensive as you like. Offcourse it is convenient to have ones own bowling shoes when training very frequently. A ball measured to ones hand is very convenient too.

Bowling is also real nice to end a family gathering with. For any questions you can always contact me and even sponsoring our team is possible.

## Bougainville on the internet UN gets update on Bougainville peace process

Papua New Guinea's High Commissioner to the United Nations, Robert Aisi, says weapons disposal and other aspects of the Bougainville peace process must be broadly inclusive and free of outside threats.

The UN Security Council is studying a report on recent developments in the peace process, focusing on the work of the UN Observer Mission.

PNG's Minister for Inter-Government Relations, Sir Peter Barter, says the debate sends two important messages

## Bougainville to be 'free' from June 30

FROM June 30, Bougainville will finally be free from official observers in the long 16 years of its conflict. On that day the women and men wearing the bright yellow T-shirts, armbands and headgear who comprise the Peace Monitoring Group will be withdrawn. After that day peace, if it can be attained at all, will have to be self-sustaining, depending entirely on the efforts of Bougainvillians themselves. The withdrawal of the PMG follows the recent phased withdrawal of the final contingent of PNG Defence Force soldiers from Bougainville.

Minister for Inter-Government Relations, Sir Peter Barter said the PMG's departure is a challenge to the parties on Bougainville to co-operate in ensuring that peace becomes self-sustaining.

Writing in the local Bougainville newsletter, Sir Peter said: "It is also a clear expression of confidence that the challenge can be met in the two months remaining until the PMG leaves.

"As the Bougainville Peace Agreement provides, the new Constitutional arrangements for Bougainville, including autonomy and the guarantee of a referendum on Bougainville's political future with independence an available option, become operational when - and only when - the United Nations verifies, certifies and notifies the National Government that stage two of the agreed weapons disposal plan has been completed. "Former combatants have an accordingly great responsibility to free Bougainville from the presence and threat of guns before the PMG leaves."

The PMG has been on the ground for more than five years, helping to build mutual security and trust,

promoting public awareness, assisting with meetings, and providing practical support for weapons disposal. Sir Peter thanked the contributing countries for their generous support for the Bougainville peace process. "They have willingly provided personnel, equipment and very substantial funds for the PMG," he said. "They have had to adjust other important national priorities accordingly. Bougainville and the rest of Papua New Guinea appreciate the way the PMG has helped to make and build peace. "The commitment to peace displayed by the PMG, its individual members, and the sponsoring countries has been truly outstanding. The best way of honouring that commitment will be for those of us who have benefited from it to uphold our part of the deal."

Towards that end, Sir Peter repeated his previous appeals to Francis Ona and his remaining supporters, who have been among those who have benefited from peace, to support the peace process. The National Government has honoured the commitments it made in the Bougainville Peace Agreement by amending the National Constitution, and taking other initiatives to prepare for the establishment of the autonomous Bougainville Government. Sir Peter said: "Leaders and communities around Bougainville are playing their part by supporting the restoration of services, promoting and participating in economic recovery, and debating the issues involved in finalising the Bougainville Constitution. "It is now up to members of all former combatant groups - the Bougainville Revolutionary Army (BRA), the Bougainville Resistance Forces (BRF) and the Me'ekamui Defence Force (MDF) - to help make sure peace is secure by completing practical weapons disposal before the PMG leaves."

The Bougainville Peace Agreement originally forecast that the PMG could complete its assignment before the end of 2002. The agreed weapons disposal plan which formed part of the Agreement was based on work and discussion among former combatants.

In September the Bougainville Constitutional Commission was established. This 25-member commission, made up of representatives of the people of Bougainville, will draft the constitution of Bougainville. This important task is scheduled to be finalized in February 2003.

The process of peace and reconciliation has advanced so much that the peace monitors, who are present in Bougainville since 1997, are scheduled to withdraw by the middle of next year. In the words of the Australian prime minister: "... the peace monitoring group will remain there (Bougainville) while ever there is a need. We expect that need will probably have gone by the middle of next year'.

This is a traditional story that is put on paper by My good friend, the artist, Timothy Kopana. It was translated into English by Henny Kuijpers and into Dutch by me, Jan Kuijpers. The story is about the two spirit ghost brothers of South Bougainville named:

## Komakiki and Komarara

In the beginning (creation) Komakiki lived near his cannibal mother. One day Komakiki is hunting for nutagau (river frogs) with his bow and arrow when he comes across Komarara. Surprisingly their arrows shoot the same frog. Komakiki asks, "Are you Komarara"? "Yes", Komarara says and asks, "Are you Komakiki"? "Yes I am", he answers, "are you my brother"? Then Komarara asks to go home with him. Komakiki says, "That would be fine but my mother would surely eat you, she's a cannibal. You might be safe hiding in my house". So they went home to Komakiki's house. Komakiki puts a cockatoo to guide Komarara as a warning against his mother. That night Komakiki told his mother to serve two baskets of food and two cups of soup. Offcourse this could have made Komakiki's mother suspicious but she thought he was just tired and hungry. When the same thing happened next morning and again in the afternoon Komakiki's cannibal mother really got suspicious. Next night she went under her son's house and heard Komarara snoring. She decided to kill Komarara when Komakiki was in the garden. So after going to the garden with Komakiki next morning, she came back to kill Komarara. but she was discovered by the cocatoo which cried out and warned Komakiki who pleaded with his mother to spare Komarara as he, Komakiki was always alone and lonely. Komakiki's mother listened to him and so Komakiki could take Komarara to the garden. In the garden the two brothers made a plan to kill the cannibal mother. She was so strong that they could not kill her physically. They planned to dig a hole and cover the hole with small branches, leaves and earth. Then they could lead her to the hole by telling her to sit down and chew betel nut right above the pitfall. Offcourse she would fall in and they could blind her by pouring lime into her eyes. After they did this to her she told them that everybody goes to the same place after death. She also told them that when they buried her, they should not remove the plant which will grow from her grave. This would be a fruit tree.

As the tree grew the brothers tasted the different parts of it. The branches, leaves and the flowers didn't taste good at all until the tree finally beared fruits which was good to eat. Now they wondered what to call it. To find out they dropped one fruit on a bush trail and hid in the bushes to hear what the fruit would be called by passers-by. First some animals passed by. And a rooster called it Pakyrrio. Then a dog passed and said, "Who gave me any Muo (coconut) without husking it. If it was husked, I would grate it on a stone



and make Ariri (Banana pudding) and skin oil to rub my body". That's how the two brothers found the coconut name and its use.

Other people became curious about the two brother's coconut oil that they always rubbed on their bodies. At that time there were no coconut plantations yet. Their process of making coconut oil was discovered by a lizard while hiding under their stools. As the news spread people started getting coconuts for planting. So today, when our uncles want to heal somebody under the curse or possession of these two spirit ghosts, they use a coconut seedling to carry on them.

To celebrate the discovery of the two brother's coconut tree they held a feast. The pig for the feast was carried by wild chickens. Chickens still could fly at that time. Then their wings skipped, leaving them flightless until today. The pig was finally transported by sirika (small blackbirds with red eyes) to the mountains, where their home was. The village of the two brothers remains clean to this day with no rubbish, leaves and vines. The evidence that this was their settlement is still there for they planted coconut trees around the it and you can also hear them blowing panpipes at night. You never know who is sweeping and cleaning today but they keep everything clean while trying to avoid the tingling of their sikiri (traditional hats) among the vines. Their footprints can also be found there.

## HUUB'S TRAFFIC EXAMINATION

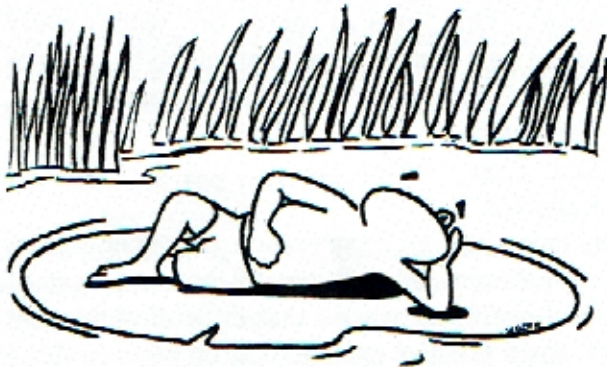
The examination goes like this. First your bike is inspected. One gets a card on witch every important part is mentioned that has to be on ones bike. I don't remember all of it but a some are:

3. Reflector

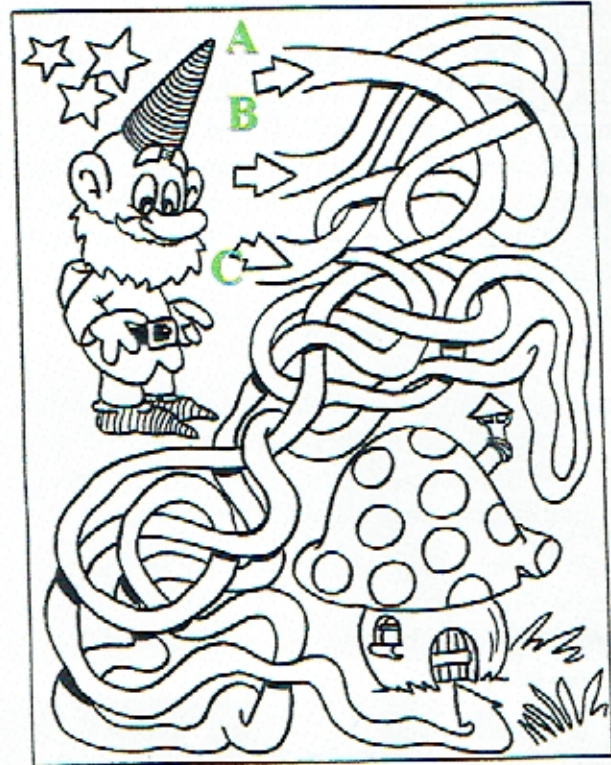

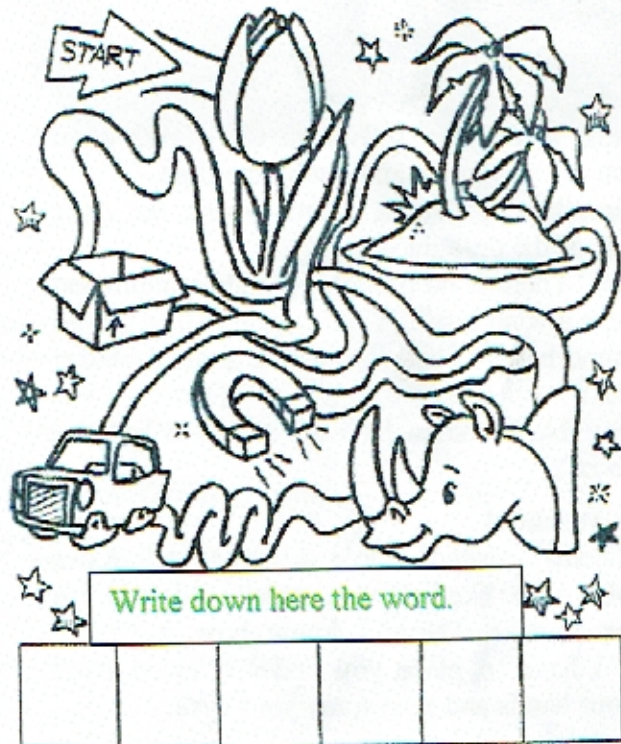
